Care UK, the PFI partner, prepared a joint application for the development. There was no pre-application community involvement in the planning process. Care UK has only a short lease on the property. The freehold belongs to Richmond Council.

Residents says that building on the site is unacceptable. They have made a formal complaint about aspects of the application, including refusal of early community involvement.

Strawberry Hill Trust gets lease to the House

The Strawberry Hill Trust will finally be handed the lease to Strawberry Hill House at the end of July signalling the start of the £8.2 million restoration. The lease transfer from St Mary's College was made possible by the grant of £4.6 million from the Heritage Lottery Fund, the final hurdle in the financing. The trust expects restoration work on Horace Walpole's iconic Gothic folly to being next year and to open to the public in 2010.

Michael Snodin, Chairman of the Trust, said: "We would like to thank our many donors, friends and volunteers for their generous support over the last five vears.

Alongside the restoration programme, we are devising a number of educational initiatives with St Mary's College and look forward to a close collaboration with Dr Arthur Naylor, the Principal, and his staff".

Developers seek to buy nearby homes

Approaches by developers to at least one local resident to sell the family home close to the development site have been made since 2004. Recently, a new developer has made several approaches.

New St James's Church plan submitted

A new plan to build an extension at the rear of St James Church in Popes Grove has been lodged with Richmond Council.

The plan concerns only the church extension and does not make any reference to an earlier plan to demolish the church hall in Radnor Road and build eight flats on the site. The Save St James's Church Hall group of residents, and others, have lodged objections with the planning authority over the new proposals. As a result, some amendments have been made.

However, objectors say these changes do not touch their core concerns which is that the extension :

- is an unsightly addition to an historic building
- intrusive to neighbours in Upper Grotto Road, Radnor Road and Pope's Grove
 raises questions of road safety and parking in Radnor
- Road
 is inadequate for community activities such as ballet and keep fit classes

Not least, residents fear that if the extension is build the church hall will be allowed to decay. No date has been set by Richmond Council for review of the application, but it is expected to go before the planning committee this summer. Objections can be lodged by end July.

Crime still tops residents' concerns - survey

Crime and security are the overriding concerns of residents according to the annual SHRA opinion poll, said co-chairman Bruce Duff at the AGM in April.

Over 100 residents responded to the poll carried out in March. The majority put crime as their first concern despite Strawberry Hill recording some of the lowest crime statistics in the country.

In this context, guest speaker PC David Hicks from the Safer Neighbourhood Team said that while the area was relatively crime-free, there were problems with anti-social behaviour in certain roads.

The Team has responded to residents' concerns by changing their shift patterns. Meanwhile, police surgeries are held every second Thursday of the month at the cricket pavilion on Twickenham Green. (*see Liaison Group below*)

Achievement

Bruce Duff cited three major SHRA achievements during the year: the landscaping of the waste land at the entrance to platform 1 at the station; the annual Christmas Carol concert which raised £300 for the Roy Kinnear Foundation and success in persuading Richmond Council to implement 30 minute parking outside the shops in Tower Road.

The Carol Singing will continue to be held at Wellesley Parade this December after residents voted overwhelmingly not to relocate it to Strawberry Hill House. One ailing tree at the station entrance was saved by regular watering. The fence will be replaced shortly.

Strawberry Hill rose

At the suggestion of John Armstrong, the AGM agreed to present a Strawberry Hill Rose to Pat Schooling, retiring member and Project Coordinator of the the Friends of Radnor Gardens, in recognition of her contribution to the gardens and the local community. The rose was presented and planted in June.

St Mary's student numbers rise each year

Student numbers are increasing by 2% to 3% a year at St Mary's University College, Russell Whitaker, the College's Director of Development told the AGM. A lot of the increase would be among older, postgraduate students who would not be resident permanently. Mr Whitaker opened the AGM with a presentation on the new sports hall which has raised questions and concerns among residents. He said that the new sports facilities were essential to meet the needs of students, especially in view of the 2012 Olympics.

He added that he was aware of the parking problems that increasing student numbers were likely to cause.

Police identify Radnor gang

Sergeant Denzil Darby from the Safety Neighbourhood team,

told the SHRA committee at their June meeting that the SNT was very aware of the anti-social behaviour in certain parts of Strawberrry Hill by groups of adolescents.

The Team knew who they were and in recent weeks had succeeded in discouraging them from gathering in Radnor Gardens late at night.

Liaison group

A police public liaison group is held every three months at the Salvation Army Hall, Twickenham Green. Notice of these meetings is posted on the SHRA board at the station. All residents of Strawberry Hill are welcome to attend.

College plan for 'green travel'

St Mary's College has produced the final draft of as Green Travel Plan presented at a public consultation on July 11.

The plan seeks to encourage alternative travel to using cars. Details can be seen on the College website: <u>www.smuc.ac.uk</u>

The 10-page document sets out plans for promoting an environmentally responsible attitude and approach to transport and travel issues so as to minimise the impact of student and staff parking on surrounding residential roads.

Strategy

The proposals are based on a strategy covering:

<u>Walking:</u> to improve pedestrian links and site permeability for staff and students. A network of paths will be created on the campus. The safest walking routes to and from the College will be established. Students will be issues with panic alarms.

<u>Cycling</u>: the College supports the London Cycle Network. Cycle paths will be constructed around the campus and a subsidised bike scheme promoted. The number of cycle tands will be increased and new showers and changing rooms set up.

<u>Public transport</u>: The College will promote its interest-free season ticket loan to staff. Students already receive public transport discounts. Information on bus and rail routes will be provided and public transport companies lobbied to set up better services.

<u>Car sharing</u>: Staff will be encouraged to share cars through a data base and will consider reduced parking charges for car sharers. The College will investigate the Car Club/Streetcar and other pay-asyou-drive car ownership options. <u>Green Travel Officer</u>: a GTO will be appointed to oversee the plan and its management.

Targets

• increase the number of staff walking and cycling to work from 11% to 14%

increase the number of students walking from 41% to 45% and those cycling from 11% to 14%
increase the numbers of staff using buses from 11% to 12% and students. The College has set the following targets: from 11% to 16%
increase the train journeys by staff from 12% to 13% and students from 17% to 19%

• decrease the number of sole occupants in cars

Car parking

The programme will be funded by revenue from car parking charges. The number or parking permits will be reduced from 400 to 200.

Transport Station to get face lift

After much urging by SHRA, South West Trains have confirmed that the footbridge at Strawberry Hill station will be repainted in August.

More Sunday trains

From December 9 the Sunday service through Strawberry Hill will be increased to two trains an hour from 12.30 onwards. The additional service will run from Waterloo via Richmond and terminate at Kingston, return to Waterloo via Richmond.

'My little gothic castle'

It is great news that Strawberry Hill House, our architectural jewel in the crown, will finally be restored.

Horace Walpole built Strawberry Hill between 1747 and his death in 1790 converting a coachman's cottage into what he described as 'my little gothic castle'

One of a string of famous eighteenth century villas along the Arcadian stretch of the Thames between Chiswick and Hampton Court, Strawberry Hill Gothic has become an internationally recognised style of architecture. Its influence is seen all over the world.

The restoration programme includes structural repairs and renewal of services, the conservation of the remarkable historic fabric, including the unique collection of renaissance stained glass, and the restoration of exterior features such as the pinnacles.

The garden, too, will be restored to something reminiscent of Walpole's original design. Strawberry Hill will be open to the public on Sunday afternoons until the end of October 2007 and for special Tours or educational visits by appointment.
