
Local Issues

To ensure that residents are informed about developments at the Council, we have invited **Richard Bennett**, one of our councillors for South Twickenham Ward, to provide an update on issues that will affect Strawberry Hill. SHRA is an apolitical organisation and any opinions expressed are the councillor's own.

Councillor's Update

Councillor Richard Bennett, Leader of the Green Group & Leader of the Opposition, London Borough of Richmond-upon-Thames (<u>Cllr.r.bennett@richmond.gov.uk</u>).

A recent puzzle is the installation of the fencing on the platform of Strawberry Hill Station closely followed by its de-installation. Network Rail say that they installed it in response to residents with gardens facing the platform who had concerns about privacy and noise. Network Rail and South Western Railway then 'agreed' to take it down and install the chain fencing. The reason given was maintenance costs, notably graffiti. It later emerged that South Western Railway was responsible and that this issue should have been discussed with Ward Councillors. Network Rail now say that they are exploring the possibility in May of planting vegetation to enhance privacy.



On buses, it is encouraging that Fulwell Bus Garage is now about 60% electric. The newer buses are also GPS governed, which limits them to the speed limit of 20mph (more accurately to 18mph which is even more unpopular with drivers). The R68 has been restored to its Kew Retail Park terminus after finishing in Twickenham for the last six months. Sadly, this does not mean that the TfL Manor Road roadworks in Richmond has been completed.

I have often encountered misleading information on the digital information displays at bus stops. An example is a long predicted delay in the arrival of a R70 or a 33 bus followed by an almost immediate arrival of one. Alternatively, one is predicted to imminently arrive but then disappears from the screen. Please do let me know if I am not alone in the experience.

I have picked up a new acronym. The new barriers outside Richmond Station are referred to as HVM. It is an anti-terrorism measure of the sort we have become all too familiar with and means Hostile Vehicle Mitigation.

Audit and Standards

II am now the Chair of the Council's Audit and Standards Committee. This is the only Committee that can be chaired by an Opposition Party Councillor. I aim to make it independent, objective, assertive, and respected. I take the Committee's scrutiny role very seriously but must rely on ensuring a non-party political ethos.

I shall after six years be taking a break from the Planning Committee. However, this offers the prospect of more help and advice to residents on planning applications because I am permitted to become an 'Interested Councillor'.

Crime in Strawberry Hill

The last Police Liaison Group meeting (PLG) was held on 15 January 2024. South Twickenham has a full team of a Sergeant, two police officers and one PCSO. The team are Kyle Mackenzie, PC Greg Roberts, PC Raymond Sullivan and Sgt. Jason Hudson. The current abstraction rates from the Ward (where our officers are called in to help in other situations) are now 20% with an average of 18% for the year.

The number of reports for violence has fallen since the last set of figures. Theft of/from motor vehicles/pedal cycles has fallen overall. Burglary reports have risen this quarter. However, these are mostly shed burglaries. The Home Office has changed the reporting systems. This will show a split in these crimes so that house burglaries and shed burglaries are counted differently. The majority of shed burglaries involve bicycles that are the thieves' target item of choice. In November there was an increase in burglaries, most of which have been where the suspect has gained entry by smashing a window or breaking through the front door and,

on a few occasions, taking car keys and stealing the vehicle parked on the driveway. Five of the pedal cycle thefts were from sheds.

The main area of vulnerability for bike thefts has been St. Mary's University, outside Pure Gym and Strawberry Hill Station.

Robbery: Two of the robberies were attempted and, luckily, no property was taken.

Another was on the Green where they stole the victim's phone. St. Mary's University generates the most amount of crimes per postcode. There was a suspect arrested at the University who had been stealing laptops from the Library which accounted for six crimes

Two arrests were made during this period. One male was arrested after a house burglary where the vehicle was stolen. A vehicle pursuit was authorised when the vehicle was spotted and the suspect was detained and arrested. One suspect was arrested for burglary and fraud after an investigation. The suspect is currently on remand in prison and appeared in court on 1 February for sentencing. This suspect has numerous other offences to count, i.e. criminal damage, two instances of racially aggravated public disorder; two assaults on police.

Stabbing at the Station: British Transport Police officers were called to Strawberry Hill Station at 23.53pm on Monday 8 January to reports of an injured man in his 20s. Officers quickly attended alongside colleagues from the Metropolitan Police and paramedics from the London Ambulance Service. The victim who had been stabbed, died at the scene and a 16-year-old boy was found with a stab wound to the leg in Alexander Close shortly after the attack. The murder investigation team is led by Detective Inspector Paul Attwell and four men were soon arrested. The Station remained closed on the Tuesday and many trains were cancelled while an intensive search of the crime scene was undertaken. Areas were also taped off in Wellesley Court and Alexander Close which Scene-of-Crime Officers attended.

The victim was later named as 21-year-old Anojan Gnananeswaran, a third-year University student of accountancy and finance. He was also a black belt karate ace who competed in the World and European championships. Floral tributes were laid outside the station on Wellesley Parade. His family requested that their privacy be respected at a very difficult time.

On 13th February, Dino Donaldson, 19, of Caxton Road, Ealing, appeared at Westminster Magistrates Court charged with one count of murder and two counts of possession with intent to supply Class A drugs. He was next due to appear at the Old Bailey on 15th February.

150th Anniversary of the Station

On Friday 8 December Her Worship the Mayor of Richmond, Councillor Suzette Nicholson commemorated the 150 Anniversary of the opening of Strawberry Hill Station on Monday 1 December. In her welcoming speech to SHRA's 'Carols in the Village' event, she acknowledged the



role of Lady Waldegrave in pushing for a station in Strawberry Hill, so that the many distinguished visitors to her salon at Strawberry Hill House could arrive more easily from central London. It is also suggested that she had a financial interest as a local land owner who could see the potential for residential development. To remind residents and commuters of the anniversary, we also posted a poster on the SHRA noticeboard at the station.

The saga of the noise barriers at Strawberry Hill station

Back in April 2023 we reported that Network Rail had begun installing noise barriers (thick wooden fencing) on platforms 1 and 2. The fences were not treated with anything other than wood preservative and we expressed concern that (as one resident put it) they would become 'large blank canvasses free for the taking'. Given other graffiti attacks in the area we were worried that the boards would soon be covered by tags creating an uglier and more threatening atmosphere. Network Rail said that they would prosecute if taggers are caught on camera (24-hour graffiti helpline is 03457 114141). There was also a concern that the new barrier on platform 2 obscured the view of the alley running to Popes Avenue increasing the feeling of insecurity for commuters returning in the dark. However, the contractor left the job before its completion leaving metal fencing behind on platform 1 and the noise barrier also unfinished. No one seemed to know why the job was left unfinished.

Then in January the plot thickened as residents received a letter from the Network Rail Community Relations team headed 'Resuming of Rail Improvement Work – Installation of Chain-link and Noise Barrier fencing, platforms 1 and 2, Strawberry Hill Station'. The description of works was unclear, to say the least, so we contacted the helpline and a query was duly logged. In the meantime, residents were shocked to see the removal of the expensive noise-barrier fencing on both platforms. The reason given by Network Rail was that the Train Operating Company, South Western Railway, had (for reasons unstated) rejected it and demanded its replacement with standard link fencing. We were under the impression that, in such infrastructure developments, Network Rail would call the shots, but apparently not. Whatever the merits or drawbacks of the noise-barrier fencing, everyone should be appalled at the lack of joined-up planning, and the waste of taxpayers' money and all that wood!

The SHRA Litter Picks

Who would have thought litter picking would hit the national news? The Great British Spring Clean took place between 15-31 March when individuals and groups were urged to fill a bag of litter in their locality. The Strawberry Hill Spring Clean is taking place on Saturday 13 April from 9-11am, when we aim to litter pick all of the 42 streets and closes of our area.

The monthly SHRA litter picks are now a well-established part of the local community scene. There is a What's App group of 20 committed residents who form the core of regular pickers who have been turning out in all weathers (to join the group, email us at contact@shra.org.uk). Louisa Carradine, our environment coordinator, manages the group and provides all equipment courtesy of our partnership with Habitats & Heritage. Newcomers are welcome to join regulars on the second Saturday of each month at 9am on the 'SHRA-bench' in front of Wellesley Parade. A complete list of dates for 2024 are set out in the table below. We usually pick for up to an hour and leave the bags collected by the recycling centre at the Wellesley Parade and Popes Avenue junction. These bags are then collected by the Council's contractors, Continental Landscapes.

Litter picking is a surprisingly satisfying way of contributing to the collective well-being of the community. The presence of our pickers on their streets reminds residents of the value of keeping our streets litter free. We encourage residents to take charge of their own streets and we know of at least four people who make regular picks of the street in which they live. We also encourage everyone to pick up their own spillages that inevitably occur on collection day. There are people who think that it is the job of Council workers/contractors to keep the streets clean, however, there is no harm in lending a hand and picking up the smaller items that are often missed – plastic bottle caps etc.

SHRA also works in partnership with the student volunteering team at St Mary's University. On St Valentine's Day we repeated the experiment of last year by including 'Radnor Gardens Litter Pick' in the list of options for National Student Volunteering Week (12-16 February). Matt Doyle, the Student Opportunities Coordinator said that various volunteering organisations would be visiting the University to talk to students about opportunities in the area. Students also have a session on how volunteering can boost employability while bringing enjoyability. Matt expected about 50 students to volunteer during the week.

On a cloudy Wednesday morning we attracted nine students to the pick in Radnor Gardens. They were mainly members of the Rugby League team who were happy to go into the murkier corners of the park to shift some of the hard-to-reach rubbish. They also cleaned the rockery areas which are next to the railings on Cross Deep and which tend to attract a lot of rubbish thrown or blown through the fence.

The Mayor Admires SHRA Tree

The annual 'Carols in the Village' event took place on Friday 8 December between 6pm and 7.30pm at Wellesley Parade. Planning for the event started months before as we had to seek permission from the Council for road closures and to have electricians test the lamppost to be used for lighting the Christmas tree. The cost of living crisis has also affected the price of the annual Village tree which now costs £660 (includes erection, lighting decoration, removal, recycling). SHRA is assisted by a Council grant which covers most of the costs of the tree but the event itself costs more than double that amount. As last year, we have filled the funding gap with the generous help of our sponsors: Architecture WK Ltd; Brightlife Chemist; Everydays Convenience Store; Faith Hair & Beauty; Jawbone Brewing; LJ Motorcycles; MKG 3000 Mazda & Volvo; Riverside Supermarket; Sopa Thai Restaurant; St Mary's University; Strawberry Hill Golf Club; Strawberry Hill Local & Post Office; Twickenham Body Health; V3 Design & Print. We produced a banner advertising the event and thanking our sponsors which was displayed on the SHRA bench in Wellesley Parade next to the Christmas tree.

We were fortunate in that the night was cold and dry. Members of the SHRA Committee had sourced the mince pies and treats for children and warmed up several containers of mulled wine. The members of Richmon-

Brass Band turned up early on their pitch outside of Sopa Thai Restaurant to play some tunes before the official start of the proceedings. This year we were pleased that Her Worship the Mayor of Richmond Councillor Suzette Nicholson and her Consort (husband) was able to kick off the event by commemorating 150 years of Strawberry Hill Station. Those at-

tending were invited to contribute to the Mayor's two charities and altogether £220 was raised on the night.

As is the custom, Richmond Brass Band went through the repertoire of eight traditional carols – Committee members had distributed copies of the words so that everyone could sing along. There were a large number of children in attendance compared to previous years and a lot of them helped to decorate the tree with additional baubles. The inclusion of Archdeacon Cambridge's C of E Primary School and St James's RC Primary School within the SHRA boundary meant that for the first time the schools advertised the event to parents. This may have helped raise the number of families attending.

We estimate that at least 120 people attended a significant increase on recent years. The atmosphere as usual was festive and convivial. The extra numbers meant that once again we slightly underestimated the demand for mulled wine on a cold night.

Strawberry Hill House

Two masterpieces by Jan van Huysum

Between the 18th May and the 8th September, Strawberry Hill House will present two exquisite 18th century masterpieces by one of the most celebrated painters of still life, Dutch artist Jan Van Huysum (1682-1749).

Flowers in a Vase with Crown Imperial and Apple Blossom at the Top and a Statue of Flora (1731-2) and Fruit and Flowers in front of a Garden Vase with an Opium Poppy and a Row of Cypresses (1731-2) will be displayed in public for the first time in ten years, on loan from a private collection. Evocatively demonstrating Van Huysum's gift for creating sophisticated still life compositions packed with detail, the pairing has remained together since leaving Van Huysum's studio - incredibly rare for these kinds of paintings.

Now these exquisite examples will be displayed in the Red Bedchamber, allowing viewers to immerse themselves in a setting that is not too dissimilar to the rooms and houses where the paintings would have been viewed centuries earlier at their inception. It invites the public to engage with the intricacies of a Dutch master, as well as the 18th century fascination with nature, as reflected in Horace Walpole's home, garden and art collection.

A programme of events will be held at Strawberry Hill House to accompany the exhibition.

A talk at the Long Gallery by leading art critic Andrew Graham-Dixon will explore Van Huysum and some of the critic's other favourite paintings on Friday 17 May. A photography workshop by floral artist Leigh Chappel and flower photographer Janne Ford will give attendees the chance to create and capture their own floral designs on Saturday 18 May. For two special dates, Sunday 26 May and Wednesday 10 July, Strawberry Hill guide and librarian Carole Tucker will lead a private view and garden tour exploring Horace Walpole's interest in landscape art. On Friday 12 July, Dutch fine artist and fellow of the Society of Botanical Artists Tanya Moderscheim will give a lecture on the development of the genre in the 17th and 18th centuries. And there will also be children's workshops with art classes using real spring flowers throughout the summer.

There will also be a series of Guided Landscape Tours of Strawberry Hill Garden and Pope's Grotto - the dates for these are; 19th May, 16th June, 21st July, 18th August, 15th September, 20th October.




History & Heritage Streetwise: Radnor Road



Streetwise is a series of articles about the history of the 42 roads of Strawberry Hill. Local historian, Mike Cherry, has written a street history of Radnor Road which can be found on the SHRA website (shra.org.uk/history). This article draws on Mike's research to highlight interesting facts about one of our oldest roads.

- 1. The name Radnor Road derives from John Robartes, 4th Earl of Radnor, who lived at Radnor House in Cross Deep between 1722 until 1757.
- 2. Radnor Road and much of Strawberry Hill lies within the medieval South Field in the village of Twickenham.
- 3. By 1746 the only significant property was Radnor Lodge, now 29 Radnor Road. Henry Fielding, the novelist, finished writing Tom Jones during his brief stay here during 1747/8.
- 4. On the Sauthier map of 1786/7 Radnor Road was a track providing a route from the south of South Field to Heath Lane.
- 5. The early Census returns (1841-1881) have different names for Radnor Road variously Back Lane, Narrow Lane, Chestnut Lane and Pope's Villa Gardens.
- 6. In 1878, Twickenham Local Board defined Radnor Road as beginning at Tower Road and ending at Heath Road.
- 7. The 1891 Census only had two houses that can be ascribed to Radnor Road growing to five by the 1911 Census – so it was largely undeveloped until well into the 20th century.
- 8. It is likely that for much of its life Radnor Road was as wide as the path just south of Pope's Grove.
- 9. Between about 1912 (1913 Claydon and Co Iron and Brass Founders) and 1928 (1921- A T Lusty Iron founder) there was a foundry on the land now occupied by nos. 69-79 Radnor Road.
- 10. Plans for the proposed St James' Church Parish Hall were approved by Twickenham Borough Council in 1927 and the building was later opened by the exiled King Manuel II of Portugal.

This 1915 map shows the narrow nature of Radnor Road at that time. Three tennis courts appear at the top of the road toward Heath Road. Radnor Lodge, a Nursery and St James's 'Chapel' are the main buildings.

St James's Catholic Primary School

In 2023 I visited St James's to discuss changes to the SHRA-defined boundary of Strawberry Hill to include the school. This change was later approved by the SHRA AGM in April 2023. This brief history is based on two publications: St James's School Centenary 1893-1993 and St James's Catholic Primary School: 125th Anniversary Book.

St James's School has always been closely connected to the Parish Church in Pope's Grove. When consecrating the Church in 1887 Cardinal Manning stated that until a church had a school for the children of the poor 'it was but imperfectly finished'. The Rector, Father English, immediately began a school building fund and six years later the school opened in Grosvenor Road, Twickenham (close to London Road). The original mixed school cost £1,350 to build (excluding the land) and could accommodate 120 children aged four to fourteen.

In the period up to nthe First World War reports were generally favourable although attendance was sometimes poor because of a range of childhood ailments including 'ringworm, colds, chickenpox, rheumatism, scarlet fever and diphtheria'.

During the 1930s it was clear that the buildings were inadequate for the numbers attending. As early as 1922 discussions had been held about moving it to Orford Gardens (where Abbotsmede Close is today). However, the decision was made to rebuild it on the existing site meanwhile some children were taught in the Parish Hall in Radnor Road. By 1957 the school had six classrooms and a small hall. However, the inadequacies of the site continued as children had nowhere to play and Grosvenor Road was increasingly busy.

The Westminster Diocese and the local education authority discussed alternative sites and again the Orford Gardens site was in the frame but it was rejected as too confined. Land had become available in Wellesley Road after Fortescue House owned by Shaftesbury Homes had been demolished. The new St James's Catholic Primary school was opened in March 1976. Remarkably only two days were allowed to move the contents of the school from Grosvenor Road

In July the new building was officially opened by Cardinal Basil Hume. The school became a three-form entry in 2002 and a new motto was adopted 'put out into the deep'. Pupils are now drawn from four parishes: Church of St James, Twickenham; St Theodore of Canterbury, Hampton-upon-Thames; St Francis de Sales, Hampton Hill; and St Margaret of Scotland, St Margarets-on-Thames.

Famous Social Anthropologist lived in Strawberry Hill

While researching publicans at Pope's Grotto Hotel in Cross Deep, I came across the name of (later 'Sir') Edward Evan Evans-Pritchard (known as E-P) living with his mother at number 16 (Strawberry Hill/Twickenham border). During the 1920s and early 1930s he was undertaking post-graduate studies at the London School of Economics under Bronislaw Malinowski, while living in Twickenham. In 1930, while researching the Nuer people of the Upper Nile, he contracted a serious case of malaria and came back home to convalesce. By 1932 he took up a post at the University of Egypt in Cairo, so his time in the area was short. After the War he became one of the founders of social anthropology as Professor of Social Anthropology at Oxford University from 1946-1970.
